Cellphones, a wonder of technology, are used to report emergencies, locate directions, call home, message friends, do business from the park or golf course. Life without them is now difficult to imagine. But cellphones have been proven deadly if employed while driving a vehicle or walking down the street. The mistakes that cellphone users make are as many and varied. It may be as trivial as getting off the wrong floor from a lift; or as serious as fatally falling down a flight of stairs. And most common of all; people getting knocked down by all kinds of vehicles. We should promote safety by following some rules. Never use a cellphone while driving, or while crossing or walking along a road. Always stop your vehicle carefully before you answer the phone. If you are on a busy road where you can't stop, and your phone rings, it is best to miss that call. If you get calls constantly, ask your service provider to activate voice mail which will say that you'll return the call later. If you have a passenger, place the phone where he or she can answer it for you. Whether you are in a taxi, but, your own car or a friend's, you must stop any driver from speaking on the phone while driving.

One may often come across stories, pictures or videos that depict farm hands laboring to till their fields in the country's hinterlands using a heavy, unwieldy wooden plough.

To many of us it is just a piece of news, a sad irony, that India no longer shines in villages, but not for Gopal Bhise, a small farmer from Jalgaon District, Maharashtra. Bhise owns some land but is so poor that he cannot afford a pair of plough animals or rent a tractor.

One day on his way to the field, Bhise happened to see a grocer transporting four big sacks of flour on a bicycle.

He realized that though the activity appeared tedious, the grocer would have saved the cost of cartage, and he thought, "Why should I not modify the bicycle for the purpose of farm operations"?

Bhise set to work on this idea, and after a lot of trial and error, he came out with an implement-fashioned out of the front axle, wheel

and handle bar of a standard bicycle that could be used by marginal farmers to execute functions carried out by bullocks or tractors.

People would laugh at him but he persisted in believing in his idea. Perseverance paid off and his portable implement, christened 'Krishiraja' was received very well in the local market and has won him the National Innovation Award.

He has made more than two hundred devices so far. The 'Krishiraja' currently sells for ₹ 1200 a piece. There are over 200 farmers who use Bhise multipurpose bicycle weeder, which vouch for its success. "It was my frustration at the plight of poor farmers like me that made me develop this device. For us a bicycle is more affordable than a pair of bullocks", says Bhise. With the help of GIAN (Grassroots Innovation Augmentation Network), his innovation has been transformed into a motorised device.
